



OSHA 30-Hour General Industry for Arborists and Utility Forestry Professionals

Course Description

Our OSHA 30-Hour General Industry for Arborists and Utility Forestry Professionals training course is a four-day, 30-hour LIVE video conferencing training program with special emphasis on supervisors; the course spans four weeks. Specifically geared towards arboricultural and green industry workers, the course provides “awareness level” training and is intended to increase awareness of certain factors that contribute to safety risks and injuries among industry personnel, and suggests practices to reduce the risk of injury. A focus on general industry safety and health hazards a worker may encounter on a work site are also discussed, as is an emphasis on hazard identification, avoidance, control, and prevention. Additionally, the course provides information on employee rights, employer responsibilities, and how to file a complaint.

You MUST attend ALL training hours to receive your OSHA 30-Hour card.

Following is a list of topics covered during the course:

Actual topic times may vary based on participant discussion and engagement.

- Introduction to OSHA (1 hour)
- Managing Safety and Health (2 hours)
- Walking and Working Surfaces, including Fall Protection (2 hours)
- Exit Routes, Emergency Action Plans, Fire Prevention Plans, and Fire Protection (3 hours)
- Electrical Hazards (4 hours)
- Personal Protective Equipment (2 hours)
- Material Handling (3 hours)
- Hazard Communication (Haz Com) (1 hour)
- Bloodborne Pathogens (1.5 hours)
- Ergonomics (1.5 hours)
- Machine Guarding (1 hour)
- Lock Out/Tag Out (1 hour)
- Introduction to Industrial Hygiene (1 hour)
- Fall Protection (3 hours)
- Safety and Health Program (2 hours)
- Job Site Safety/Job Briefings (1 hour)

Deliverables

Attendees who complete the course will receive an OSHA 30-Hour card recognized by OSHA and the US Department of Labor (<https://www.osha.gov/training/outreach/card-hierarchy>). **You MUST attend ALL training hours to receive your OSHA 30-Hour card.**

Attendees who complete the course will also receive a NATS-issued Electrical Hazard Awareness Training (EHAT) Certificate of Completion (valid for 12 months) AND a NATS-issued OSHA 30-Hour Certificate of Completion for this course.

- Please plan to be stationary during the course; driving while attending the course is not permitted

Note: You must be **present, visible, well-lit and participating**, focused on the class for a minimum of 10.0 hours, not including breaks or meals. The instructor must sign a sworn affidavit regarding your attendance. No multi-tasking. No watching movies in the background. No handling emails or web surfing on a separate screen. Don't be in front of a window where we can only see your shadow. Dress as if you were attending the class in person.
